WHY TEACHERS MATTER NOW MORE THAN EVER!

Will robots or other technologies eventually replace teachers? According to a recent article published by the Christensen Institute, educational technology can enhance the learning process in many ways. It CAN"T perform at least three critical functions:

- (1) Technology can't get to know a student-"Real knowing and understanding is a human-tohuman experience."
- (2) Technology can't care about a student - even the best software "can't offer a sense of genuine caring."
- (3) Technology can't provide higher-order feedback or coach soft skills like setting personal goals and overcoming obstacles
